THE ADMISSIONS PROCESS

STEP ONE: Completion of Applications

by **30TH JUNE 2017** School to return Statement of Interest and Pupil Referral form/s (Inc. of any additional information requested)

STEP TWO: Interview process

The College will book interview dates for pupils, parent/carer to attend. Pupils to complete an initial assessment, to determine the right level of qualification

STEP THREE: Tasters/Tour Sessions, Tuesday 4th July 2017

The College will book taster sessions in order for pupils to decide if the course is right for them and for the college to facilitate a smooth transitional process

STEP FOUR: Completion of Placement Agreement

School to complete Placement Agreement with the number of pupils they wish to enrol at the College

STEP FIVE: Signing of SLA

Service Level Agreement to be signed and returned to the College. A deposit will be asked for at this point in order to guarantee places

STEP SIX: Enrolment & Induction

Enrolment date and Induction pack submitted to school

STEP SEVEN: Schedule of activities

School to provide a schedule of planned school activities at the point of enrolment i.e. inset days, work experience placements, exams etc

INTRODUCTION

Lewisham Southwark College School Partnerships, is delighted to announce a career college for 14 – 16 learners. The School Partnership Officer is your first point of contact, who works across the College ensuring good attendance, safety, feedback, progression and tracking. They will liaise with your school to coordinate the requirements you may have i.e. parent/carer evenings and other activities and services that may be required. We want our students to succeed and we work closely with schools and parents to ensure this happens. We provide regular feedback with parent's evenings, progress reports and attendance reports, so that students, parents and the school are clear about how the students are progressing.

Our Curriculum Offer

In this guide we aim to offer your learners a varied range of subjects to choose from. We can offer you part-time programmes as well as four-day per week ESOL options where learners can retain their school status whilst spending the majority of the week with us.

Courses for Supported Learning may be designed for groups of learners in areas of interest that may not be currently advertised in this guide. We recommend you see our website to get a better overview of the range of subjects and qualifications we offer. If you would like to explore a tailored curriculum model, then please complete a School Statement of Interest Form (inserted in this guide or go to our website).

Lewisham Southwark College specialises in Work Related Learning (WRL) vocational/technical courses that give a real insight to the world of work and offers subjects that cannot always be studied at school. Students have access to professional standards workshops, studios and salons, and our tutors are industry professionals – providing the practical skills and knowledge needed to succeed. Support is always available and includes help with study skills and coursework, with teachers and Student Support staff on hand to offer advice and guidance in career options and progression pathways.

One day a week Work Related Learning (WRL) Programmes

We offer Key Stage 4 students the opportunity to get involved in a number of inspiring vocational/technical programmes to explore their interests, enhance their skills and introduce them to job-related courses. Work-related learning prepares Year 10 & 11 students for the 'world of work' one days a week. All courses deliver Regulated Qualifications Framework (RQF) based qualification designed to assist them with a clear Post-16 progression.

These courses are suitable for students of all abilities, but are particularly aimed at students who want to

follow a vocational route rather than A Levels. The WRL programme will put students at an advantage to progress onto a higher level vocational/ technical qualifications, apprenticeships or employment.

Four days a week ESOL/EAL English for Speakers of Other Languages.

The ESOL programmes are designed for new arrivals into the country at Year 10 and 11 who have English as a second language and do not have the language skills to enter mainstream education. The programme uses specially trained ESOL teachers to quickly develop English speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. Learners complete ESOL qualifications along with continuing to develop Maths and ICT skills. The College also offers an intensive one-year, full-time GCSE programme, with progression onto A Level programmes. These courses are very highly regarded with very high progression rates into mainstream education post 16.

One day a week School Links Supported Learning Programme

We offer students with a range of Learning Difficulties and/or Disabilities (LDD) the opportunity to attend College one day a week. Students will work towards achieving personalised individual targets and help them to get used to being at college as well as developing their confidence, communication and personal and social skills. The aim is to develop their independence through practicing travelling, using the community, shopping/cooking, independent living skills and communication. Our school links programme also offers tasters in areas like catering, retail, performing arts and art and design to help students decide what they want to do next.

* Additional costings has been added to provide all classes with a Learning Support Worker, the school has the option to provide their own Teaching Assistant, however they will be required to support pupils throughout the day.

WORK RELATED LEARNING (WRL):

Lewisham Southwark College aim is to equip Key Stage 4 pupils to connect their learning with the opportunity to 'learn by doing' and to learn from experts with various professional industries.

Lewisham and Southwark College Work-Related Learning one day a week vocational/technical programmes contribute, to Year 10 & 11 learning experience by enriching their education and giving them a greater understanding of the 'world of work' which lies ahead of them.

This will play a vital role in young peoples' journey to develop knowledge, skills and concepts, including learning through the experience of work, learning about work and working practices, and learning the skills for work. Your pupils will have the opportunity to achieve:

- › the world of work and explore occupation options;
- › develop employability skills that employers value;
- › build their enterprise capability and;
- › make more informed choices about their career options.

The Work Related Learning day release courses allow Year 10 & 11 learners to continue with their GCSEs at school while studying a vocational course on one day per week over two years. Learners attend the College on the following days: **Year 10: Monday's & Year 11: Friday's**

Entry Requirements

For all of our courses students will need to attend an interview and complete an initial assessment to ensure they are placed on the right course. Entry Level 3 courses are especially designed for students who want to study vocational subjects. The entry requirements are an interest in the chosen course and a commitment to attending regularly and working hard. Students need to have a basic level of literacy and numeracy and typically will have achieved Level 2 or 3 in Year 9. Level 1 Courses are typically aimed at students who gained Levels 3 and 4 in Key Stage 3. Students will need to demonstrate their interest & commitment to their chosen course.

Understanding the Levels

The levels we use in colleges are different to those used in schools. See below for a simplified explanation. However, please remember that these are vocational qualifications usually completed by adults so it is usual to start at Entry Level or Level 1 in order to build up your skills.

College levels equivalent school levels

Entry Level:	Pre-GCSE
Level 1:	GCSEs Grades D - G (3 - 1 under new grading system)
Level 2:	GCSEs Grades A*-C (9 - 4 under new grading system)



HOSPITALITY AND CATERING:

Why study Hospitality and Catering at Lewisham Southwark College?

You'll learn in a real-life working environment: facilities include professional-standard kitchens, the latest equipment and a high-class restaurant and bar

Our expert lecturers have previously worked in five-star restaurants and with famous chefs, including Gary Rhodes and Brian Turner

Successful completion of one of our courses will enable you to continue your training on one of our higher level programmes, then work for a restaurant/hotel or large food company, or even start your own business.

Who is this course for?

Year 10 and Year 11 students at all levels of academic achievement, who want to learn practical vocational/technical skills and gain a vocational qualification alongside their GCSEs. The course lasts for 2 years and is held at our Lewisham Campus.

What are the entry requirements?

You should have an interest in catering and want to work in the catering industry. You will have an initial assessment in English and maths.

What qualification will I achieve?

The following students may achieve the following:

- › Year 10 - Entry 3 - Introduction to Hospitality
- › Year 11 - Level 1 - Introduction to Hospitality

Students with limited skills and attendance issues will receive a College Certificate.

How will I be assessed?

Practical assessments and Portfolio based

BEAUTY:

Why study Beauty at Lewisham Southwark College?

Do you have passion for beauty/skincare? Do you love to bring out the beauty in people? If YES, The Work Related Learning programme will prepare you on the pathway towards a wide range of career opportunity within the beauty industry. You might choose to work within the spa therapy industry or as a nail technician or make-up artist - or even specialise in film or TV work. Or your goal might be to start t up your own beauty business.

Who is this course for?

Year 10 and Year 11 students at all levels of academic achievement, who want to learn practical vocational/technical skills and gain a vocational qualification alongside their GCSEs. The course lasts for 2 years and is held at our Lewisham Campus.

What are the entry requirements?

You should have an interest in the beauty and want to explore and interested in developing your skills in the beauty industry. You will have an initial assessment in English and maths.

What qualification will I achieve?

VTCT Entry Level Certificate in an Introduction to the Hair and Beauty Sector

VTCT Level 1 Certificate is an Introduction to the Hair and Beauty Sector

How will I be assessed?

Observations, practical assessment, assignments, reflective accounts, and oral/written questioning.

CONSTRUCTION:

Why study Construction at Lewisham Southwark College?

You'll benefit from first-class practical training taught by lecturers who have worked in construction trades for many years, and impressive construction facilities at our huge Deptford campus

Our excellent links with industry and the surrounding community enable students to gain valuable work experience that gives them the edge when they look for work – or may even lead directly to a job

As well as hands-on training, you'll learn vital professional skills, including how to properly cost a job, and how to work with customers to produce client-pleasing work

Who is this course for?

This course is suitable for year 10 & 11 pupils who want to gain all round construction skills. It will appeal to pupils who enjoy more practical activities and working with their hands. The course can be quite physically demanding, but it will introduce students into the industry. This course is based at our Deptford campus

The course is an ideal start for pupils wishing to gain employment in the construction industry or an apprenticeship with a company.

What are the entry requirements?

You should have an interest in the building works or construction and want to explore and interested in developing your skills in the building/construction industry. You will have an initial assessment in English and maths.

What will I study?

The course involves practical and written work. You will spend time in the construction trades workshops developing skills in 3 practical trades, such as joinery (carpentry), brickwork, and painting and decorating. You will learn health and safety practices, and the personal and social skills required to succeed in the industry. You will learn about starting work in the construction industry, developing skills and working safely in construction, and personal effectiveness, and you will learn practical trades.

What qualification will I achieve?

Level 1 Award in Multitrade Construction Activities

How will I be assessed?

Your practical skills will be assessed in the workshops and you will be required to complete a portfolio of written work to a satisfactory standard.

Progression/ Destination routes

Learners can progress onto a course or an apprenticeship in a specific Construction trade including: -

- › Diploma Level 1 - Bricklaying
- › Diploma Level 1 - Carpentry & Joinery
- › Diploma Level 1 - Painting & Decorating

AWARD IN SPORT:

Why study Sport at Lewisham Southwark College?

We have an inspiring team with progression routes into our sports academies at level 2. You will get to take some practical lessons at Crystal Palace National Sports Centre with state of the art facilities. We have excellent sports placements that can provide paid sessional work. You will learn about health and fitness and the sports industry.

Who is this course for?

This course is suitable for Year 10 or 11 students who have a passion for sport and have experience in actively participating in a range of sporting activities. This course complements the delivery of the National Curriculum for Physical Education in England and Wales, GCSE PE, BTEC in Sport and Recreation and PSHE.

What are the entry requirements?

You should have an interest in sports and want to develop your sporting skills, knowledge and career options within the Sports industry. You will have an initial assessment in English and maths.

What qualification will I achieve?

City & Guilds L1 Award in Sport

How will I be assessed?

Portfolio based and practical assessments

ENTRY LEVEL CERTIFICATE IN CHILD DEVELOPMENT:

Why study Child Development at Lewisham Southwark College?

It provides learners with an opportunity to focus on Child Development from conception to the age of five, and actively engage in it so they can develop as confident learners. They'll also have the chance to develop knowledge and understanding of human needs within a diverse society, and evaluate evidence, make reasoned judgements and present conclusions.

Who is this course for?

This course is suitable for Year 10 or 11 students who have a keen interest in child development. It will provide learners with an opportunity to focus on Child Development. Develops knowledge and understanding of human needs within a diverse society.

- › You can have a greater level of practical involvement with this qualification than at GCSE.
- › Pupils also have an opportunity to move to or from the GCSE qualifications.

What are the entry requirements?

Working in Early Years is extremely rewarding but demands essential knowledge and expertise. If you would love to work with children and young people, this courses will help set you on the right path.

What qualification will I achieve?

OCR Entry Level Certificate in Child Development

How will I be assessed?

Portfolio based and practical assessments

L1 Certificate in Childcare or HSC Courses

ESOL STUDY PROGRAMMES

Overview of Study Programmes in the UK

One-year Study Programmes includes Vocational/Academic Subjects; Maths and English (working towards a level higher than that on entry to the programme); Employability Skills (including 1 week of Work Experience); Tutorials (to include Personal, Social and Behavioural Development); and Enrichment and preparation skills for Progression/ Next Steps.

Vocational/Academic subject

(6 hrs per week English, 1.5 hrs per week ICT)

- › English (ESOL): leading towards English Awards (Pre-Entry classes), Functional Skills English (Edexcel) at Entry level to Level 1, or GCSE English (AQA). Also includes embedded Personal, Social and Behavioural Development topics such as Study Skills, Communication Skills, Positive Citizenship, Health and Safety, Safeguarding, etc.
- › ICT: leading towards College Certificate (Pre-Entry classes), Functional Skills ICT (Edexcel) at Entry level to Level 1, or GCSE in Computer Science.

Maths and English

(3 hrs per week Maths, 6 hrs per week English)

- › Maths: leading towards Maths Awards (Pre-Entry classes), Functional Skills Maths (Edexcel) at Entry level to Level 1, or GCSE Maths (Edexcel).
- › English: embedded in our Vocational/Academic offer as a specialist need for speakers of other languages, enabling them to progress onto a GCSE pathway.

Employability Skills

(1.5 hrs per week, leading to Work Experience in summer term)

- › Employability Skills: weekly sessions led by specialist teachers, helping students develop language and soft skills needed for the world of work. 36 hrs (1 week) of work experience for every student in the spring and summer terms. Students keep log books of experience gained in part-time paid or voluntary work.

Tutorials (1 hour per week)

- › Individual Tutorials: meetings with tutors to discuss progress, set and review targets, address issues around attendance and any personal issues. Referrals can be made to student services or outside agencies, as appropriate. Review weeks with parent/carer meetings in October and March.

Enrichment (2 hrs per week)

- › Enrichment activities: organised by Vocational Tutors, Course Tutors, Progress Coaches or Student Experience staff. These include: vocational tasters, trips and workshops to local and London-based places of interest; sports activities; cooking classes; film screenings; discussion groups; drama workshops; creating class newspapers and audio blogs; etc.

Progression (Discussions during class/tutorial time and as part of Enrichment)

- › Students will have the opportunity in their English lessons to present and discuss career aspirations and next steps.
- › Entry level students will be encouraged to apply for higher level ESOL courses within Lewisham Southwark College. Entry 3, Level 1 and GCSE students will be supported to apply for vocational or academic courses of their choice and at a level appropriate to their abilities.

What will I do on an ESOL study programme at the college?

- › As well as completing your qualification, you'll have the opportunity to:
 - Enjoy enrichment activities
 - Gain English and maths qualifications at the required levels
 - Benefit from tutorial support
 - Develop employability skills
 - Gain work experience
 - Get support with job/college applications and interview preparation

GCSEs FOR ESOL/EAL STUDENTS

An intensive one-year, full-time course for students aged 14 – 16, whose first language is not English (New Arrivals to the country or borough).

You will study in small groups, with specialist teachers, who will help you to develop your English alongside the main subject areas.

You will take GCSEs in the following subjects at the end of the year:

- › English Language
- › Maths
- › Combined Science (Double Award)
- › ICT
- › Modern Foreign Language (as available, in your first language)

You will also have classes in **Employability** and **Personal** and **Social Development, individual Tutorials, Enrichment** and **Work Placement** opportunities.

You will get support from your course tutor and to help you with your study skills, academic and pastoral needs.

You will receive help to **progress** onto higher-level courses (A levels or BTEC level 3) or into employment. In the last 3 years, all of our students have been successful in gaining places in London 6th forms, colleges and work placements.

English Language

What can I expect?

You will have 4 hours of English per week. We will be following the AQA exam board. The English Language course is assessed solely through two final exams in the summer of 2017.

You will study a mix of fiction and non-fiction texts from 19th, 20th and 21st centuries. The key skills assessed are: reading non-fiction, reading literary fiction, comparing texts, writing a range of texts (description, narrative, argument). You will also be analysing structure and writers' points of views. Special emphasis will be on developing individual skills in English as an Additional Language alongside the English language skills needed for your GCSE course.

You will complete weekly homework to develop your reading and writing skills and read a wide range of texts. There will also be 2 mock exams which you must attend.

You will have access to Cross-College resources in English (support sessions and online resources), and will be required to also undertake independent study.

Maths

What can I expect?

We will be following the Edexcel exam board. You will have 4 hours of maths per week.

You will have access to Cross-college resources and support for Maths (support sessions and online resources), and will be required to undertake weekly independent study. There will be 2 mock exams for maths, which you must attend.

Science

What can I expect?

You will study GCSE Combined Science (Double Award). You will have 8 hours for each week and we will be following the Edexcel exam board. You will attend lab classes in Biology, Chemistry and Physics and you will complete Controlled Assessments during lesson time under exam conditions.

You will develop your skills to enable you to collect evidence, research using IT and books, and analyse data.

- › Edexcel set the Controlled Assessment and outline the practical work and data processing candidates should complete
- › You complete the Controlled Assessment test in class time
- › Your teachers mark their Controlled Assessment using marking guidance from Edexcel
- › Edexcel moderate the teachers' marks

ICT

What can I expect?

You will have 4 hours of ICT and we will be following the OCR syllabus. The four units covered are: *ICT in today's world, Practical applications in ICT and ICT in context, Creative use of ICT or Coding a solution*. You will learn to research and apply practical solutions to ICT problems, and topics covered include ICT systems and networks, data security, information management and project planning. Assessment will be through controlled assessments and final written exams.

GCSES FOR ESOL/EAL STUDENTS CONTINUED

Modern Foreign Languages

What can I expect?

Where possible we encourage you to take a GCSE in a Modern Foreign Language you are already familiar with. You will not have timetabled classes in these but you will meet with a language tutor and receive guidance on how to prepare for your exam.

In previous years our students have taken GCSEs in Arabic, Bengali, Farsi, French, German, Mandarin, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Tamil, Turkish and Urdu.

SUPPORTED LEARNING LINK COURSES

The College offers students with learning difficulties and other support needs the opportunity to attend college, usually one day or half a day a week. Courses are flexible and their structure and content are agreed between the school and the Supported Learning Department and are tailored to meet the need of students/groups. The opportunity to attend college supports students in making informed choices about their future progression as well as giving them the opportunity to experience working in a mainstream environment with support.

Most students work on developing their independence and confidence in college alongside developing communication and personal and social skills. Link programmes can also offer tasters in vocational areas like catering, retail, performing arts and art and design to help students decide what they want to do next. 16-18 APPRENTICESHIPS

Overview

Apprenticeships combine practical training in a job with study. Being an apprentice means that you have a job that includes gaining recognised qualifications and essential skills whilst you are working and earning a wage

As an apprentice you will:

- › work alongside experienced staff
- › gain job-specific skills
- › earn a wage and get holiday pay
- › study towards a related qualification

Timescales

This will vary according to the employer, the type of occupation you are training for and the level of Apprenticeship, but Apprenticeships normally take between one and four years.

The length of time taken to complete your training will also depend on your own skills and ability.

Levels of Apprenticeship

An apprenticeship has an equivalent education level and can be:

- › Intermediate - is equivalent to 5 GCSE passes
- › Advanced - is equivalent to 2 A level passes
- › Higher - can lead to NVQ Level 4 and above, or a foundation degree

Who can Apply?

You can apply for an apprenticeship while you're still at school. To start one, you'll need to be:

- › 16 or over
- › Living in England
- › Not in full-time education

Pay and Conditions

You'll be paid during your Apprenticeship.

You are entitled to the National Minimum Wage. The current minimum wage rate for an Apprentice is £3.50 per hour. This rate applies to apprentices aged 16 to 18.

Often the rate of pay will increase as you become more skilled and experienced.

As an Apprentice the hours you can expect to be paid for must include:

- › your normal working hours (minimum 30 hours per week)
- › training that's part of your apprenticeship (usually one day per week)

At Lewisham Southwark College we offer a wide range of Apprenticeships in:

Hospitality and Support Services

- › Hospitality Services Intermediate Apprenticeship
- › Food and Beverage Service Intermediate Apprenticeship
- › Licenced Hospitality Intermediate Apprenticeship and Advanced Apprenticeship
- › Food Production and Cooking Intermediate Apprenticeship
- › Hospitality Supervision Leadership Advanced Apprenticeship
